COSEE SouthEast Ocean Awareness Day

Enjoy "Ocean Exploration with Real Scientific Data" at the N.C. Maritime Museum, 315 Front Street, Beaufort, N.C., on Monday, Feb. 16, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. The event is sponsored by the Center for Ocean Sciences Education Excellence SouthEast (COSEE-SE), which serves educators in North and South Carolina and Georgia.

Discover how to tap into ongoing scientific data collection and bring it into the classroom. Activities include a presentation by Hans Paerl of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill on the state's FerryMon project, a tour of a working research vessel, and reviews of several lesson plans and resources. The six-hour workshop — including lunch, door prizes and associated resources — is free and can be submitted for 0.6 CEU credit.

Prior to Ocean Awareness Day, kayak the calm waters of the Rachel Carson Reserve and explore barrier island ecology on Sunday, Feb. 15, from 12 to 4 p.m. Kayaks, equipment and instruction are provided through the workshop for the discounted price of \$15. Counts 0.4 hours toward completion of CEU credit.

Later that day at 3 p.m., join N.C. Heritage Tourism Officer Connie Mason for a free program focusing on the oyster through history, stories and song.


Saturday, April 11 is the opening of the temporary exhibit "Traditional North Carolina Watercrafts," which will be open through September 28.

Scales and Tails Weekend in March



"Undercurrents" Now Available

To make middle school students more aware of the importance of a clean environment, North Carolina Big Sweep recently produced *Undercurrents: A Big Sweep Middle School Teacher's Guide.* Written by two North Carolina classroom teachers, this publication includes 11 litter awareness lessons correlated with state learning objectives for 8th grade science and math, as well as for healthful living, language arts and information skills. Some correlations for 6th and 7th grades also are included.

Big Sweep expects *Undercurrents* will help in the organization's quest for a litter-free environment. Litter is deadly to animals that eat it or become entangled in it. Also, litter is a human health problem when it attracts disease-carrying mosquitoes and rodents, or when it leaches chemicals into our groundwater. Litter even hurts our economy. Businesses don't want to locate to trashy areas and tourists won't spend

money in places full of garbage.

Big Sweep County Coordinators have delivered the activity guide to all public and private middle schools in North Carolina that have 8th grade teachers.

Coastal Processes and Conflicts

Geologists have amassed ample evidence that dynamic processes formed and continue to alter North Carolina's Outer Banks, however inconvenient those changes might be

for residents and visitors.

That's one lesson learned by a team of educators and students



who explored the barrier islands with ECU Geologist Stan Riggs to develop educational resources for North Carolina schools. Funded by North Carolina Sea Grant, the project resulted in a curriculum resource entitled *Coastal Processes and Conflicts: North Carolina's Outer Banks*.

The Coastal Processes and Conflicts curriculum has been introduced as a model for collaboration on resources for classrooms. The book includes extensive background information for teachers, as well as student lessons that are relevant in any setting — not just the island environment. It is appropriate for middle and high school students.

APNEP Requests Schoolyard Project Proposals

The Albemarle-Pamlico National Estuary Program (APNEP) is accepting proposals for schoolyard environmental demonstration projects.

APNEP is a partnership between the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the N.C. Department of Environment and Natural Resources and the Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation.

APNEP funds projects in a 36-county region from northeast North Carolina to southeast Virginia, including the Chowan, Pasquotank, Roanoke, Tar-Pamlico and Neuse river basins. Project proposals should address one or more topics within watersheds of the APNEP region including: water quality, vital habitats, fisheries and stewardship.

Qualifying projects should benefit the environment, occur on or adjacent to school property and have a physical structure. Projects should also have a public outreach or education component, be open to public access and be transferable so that benefits can continue after funds are spent.

Previous rounds of funding in 2005 and 2006 produced some stand-out examples of how these seed projects can yield ongoing results. Manteo Middle's rain gardens, Holmes High's stormwater demonstration project, and Moore Middle's nature trail and outdoor classroom were

highlighted in "Education in Action: Schoolyard Projects Protect Estuaries," an article in *Coastwatch* magazine. To view the article online, go to www.ncseagrant.org, click on *Coastwatch*, and look for the Autumn 2008 issue.



A total of \$50,000 is available, with up to \$12,000 for an individual project. Public and private schools are eligible, as well as government agencies and non-profit institutions. Proposals are due by March 6.
