
Greetings!

Pine Knoll Shores Aquarium Re-Opens in May www.ncaquariums.com

The N.C. Aquarium at Pine Knoll Shores re-opens May 19 after a \$25 million expansion that spans two-and-a-half years. The state-operated aquarium is triple the size of the original facility. Inside, visitors will find 93,000 square feet of aquatic wonder.

Under the new theme, "North Carolina's Aquatic Environments from the Mountains to the Sea," nearly 40 exhibits in five galleries — Mountain, Piedmont, Coastal Plain, Tidal Waters and Ocean — depict the state's aquatic zones. The aquarium will be home to 2,500 animals, both freshwater and saltwater.

The centerpiece display, the 306,000-gallon Living Shipwreck, takes visitors into the domain of ocean divers. It features a replica of the *U-352*, a German submarine the Coast Guard sank off our coast in World War II, along with sharks, colorful fishes and other animals that typically congregate around shipwrecks. Three observation windows, including one that is 63 feet long, offer superb views of the exhibit. Divers will talk to visitors via underwater microphones.

The 50,000-gallon Queen Anne's Revenge display recreates the 18th-century shipwreck near Beaufort Inlet that is thought to be the flagship of the pirate Blackbeard. It also shows the diverse marine community that the wreck attracts.

Another crowd-pleaser will be the river otter exhibit in the Piedmont Gallery, where "Pungo" and "Neuse" will frolic in a riverbank setting. Other highlights include a 32-foot mountain waterfall, a cypress swamp, a stingray touch pool, and lionfish, lobster, jellyfish, seahorses and octopus displays.

Visitors will be able to choose from a long

The N.C. Center for the Advancement of Teaching (NCCAT) provides professional development for North Carolina's public school teachers of all grade levels and subjects. NCCAT is based in Cullowee in western North Carolina. Now NCCAT looks forward to adding an eastern campus on Ocracoke Island.

Ground was broken in 2004 for the multimillion-dollar restoration. The project will transform the landmark U.S. Coast Guard Station at the mouth of Silver Lake Harbor into a residential education center. The new facility will include space for seminar sessions and dining, and residential rooms for visiting teachers. The campus will host up to 40 seminars a year, as well as a variety of weekend programs for educators.

The old Station House, vacant for the past 10 years, was the headquarters for Coast Guard lifesaving and law enforcement operations for more than 65 years. The renovation will bring new life to this historic building.

During the construction period, NCCAT will continue to offer Ocracoke-based renewal seminars for teachers who have been employed full-time in North Carolina public schools. 
